

The 20th annual Perth Poetry Festival, organized by WA Poets Inc., features invited national and local poets and offers ample opportunities for public participation in a diverse program of free and low-cost events. Professional development is also supported through workshops, seminars, panels, and networking opportunities.

The Lester Prize for Portraiture 2024

The Lester Prize is one of Australia's most prestigious awards for portraiture, celebrating the talents of artists and engaging the community. This screening debuts the finalists for this year's Lester Prize, chosen from nearly 1,000 entries vying for the coveted award.

This digital screening complements the physical exhibition at WA Museum Boola Bardip, which runs from September 13 to November 17, 2024.

The Lester Prize 2024 digital exhibition is showcased daily from August 5 to November 17 on the City of Perth Forrest Place Arts Screen.

About the Lester Prize

The Lester Prize is managed by The Lester Inc, a not-for-profit organisation founded in 2007 to provide an avenue for artists to exhibit works of portraiture within Western Australia. Working with government, peak arts bodies and community groups, it helps to diversify WA's local economy, grow cultural tourism, and activate spaces through creative placemaking. The Lester Prize provides locals and visitors with the opportunity to engage with the artform each year in a format that puts the artists and community front-and-centre.

The Lester Prize's exhibitions and public events program is targeted at diverse groups in the community and includes artist floor talks, workshops, live art demonstrations and pop-up community activations across the city.








Graham Mathwin is a Perth-based artist, videographer and writer. He graduated from Curtin University with Honours in Fine Art in 2015. His group shows include I'll love you tomorrow, Success Gallery, Perth, 2016; Hatched National Graduate Show, PICA, Perth, 2016; and Worldline, Geraldton Regional Art Gallery, 2017. His solo shows include Twice a day, every day, it fails, Free Range Gallery, Perth, 2017; Take Care, Moana Project Space, Perth, 2017; and Eager Beaver, Outer Space, Brisbane; 2019. He was editor of Sensible Perth from 2015-2017 and he now co-edits Cactus Journal.

Graham's principle interests are the guile and force of images in cinematic and photographic forms. He is currently engaged doing Higher Degree Research in Art at Curtin University.

Anna Park | Look, Look.


Chaotic collages of smiling women and bedroom whispers that mask our darkest projections. Speed streaks generate constant calls to action. Drawings exude a yearning for liberation. Emancipation from societal constraints never quite materialises.

Anna Park's first museum exhibition outside the United States presents a new body of her signature large-scale black and white drawings that feverishly capture the spirit of contemporary life. Concerned with the perpetual visibility and alienated self-awareness prevalent in our times, Park is a prominent new figure in drawing today.

Born in Daegu in 1996, Park has swiftly gained recognition for her richly detailed charcoal and ink works on paper that teeter between figuration and expressive abstraction. Inspired by popular culture, communal experiences, and more intimate interpersonal exchanges, Park addresses the cultural construction and perception of identity, sexuality, and power within our increasingly media-saturated social environments.

This year, 'The West Australian Pulse' artists explore themes of mental health and social pressures, gender and culture, environmentalism, and technology.


The West Australian Pulse exhibits at the Art Gallery of Western Australia until October, and the digital on-screen exhibition also runs through October.






