Bunuru (February - March) is the hottest time of the year, with little to exhibitions, where audiences can no rain. Hot easterly winds continue, with a cooling sea breeze most afternoons.

The warm Bunuru nights entice visitors from the metropolitan surrounds to our state's premier entertainment district, as Northbridge asserts its cultural and multicultural credentials through the weeks of the Fringe World Festival and Luadorned in intricate dragon attire visit local businesses with firecrackers, drums, and spectacle, culminating in the Chung Wah Festival and Northbridge Piazza Concert.

The city's urban screens follow this mood with nightly screenings of th award-winning contemporary art exhibition LIGHTBOX (now in its tenth year), illuminating Fringe World nights with youthful, contemporary, Fringe-esque arts. Two exceptional photographic exhibitions from Murdoch University and local artist Harry Cunningham offer a fascinating insight into perceptions of Western Australian life, and new slow TV documentaries bathe the Northbridge cityscape in the colours of Bunuru.

The Piazza offers formal screenings such as the Free Family Flicks series, where bean bags are set up for a seated audience, and informal

screenings for sporting events and find a place on the lawn, shaded by the Piazza umbrellas, and enjoy the famous Northbridge food offerings — or simply take in some artworks while strolling along James Street.

The Bunuru program presents works from over one hundred local artists.

Whether it's the excitement of the a premiere legue match, a free family movie, or simply the calm of a Bunuru sunset, we look forward to seeing you there.

Bunuru Slow TV: Celebrating the Season of Adolescence in Perth's Urban Heart

Bunuru (February - March) is the second summer in the Noongar Calendar, characterised as the season of adolescence.

Traditionally, this period has been, and continues to be, an ideal time for living and fishing along the coast, rivers, and estuaries. Consequently, freshwater foods and seafood have been significant components of the Noongar people's diet during Bunuru.

The City of Perth urban screens exhibit two slow television presentations, immersing the inner city in the colours and landscapes of the season.

The Slow TV genre embraces the meditative pace of life, typically capturing extended, unedited experiences that unfold in real-time and allow viewers to engage with content that celebrates intrinsic beauty. It offers a tranquil alternative to the high-speed narratives of mainstream media, inviting audiences to unwind and immerse themselves in the simplicity and serenity of the prolonged footage.

The documentaries feature Bunuru imagery from the banks of Derbarl Yerrigan (Swan River) and the Bunuru Sunset, filmed by Derbarl Nara (Cockburn Sound) in Coogee.

The vivid beauty and life of Boorloo's natural wonders are paired with informative snippets found on the KURONGKURL KATITJIN page of the ECU website. This collaboration provides an informed and vibrant exploration of the natural colours and hues of Bunuru, offering viewers a unique and informed perspective on Perth's natural wonders.

Immerse yourself in the nocturnal world of Northbridge with The Night Speaks, a dynamic visual journey into the energy, people, and culture that come alive after dark. Harry Cunningham, a Perth-based documentary and contemporary arts photographer, leads us through a city-scape illuminated by hidden stories and unexpected encounters.

In this evocative series, Cunningham explores the diversity and depth of the human experience. Centering much of his work on Perth's inner city and Northbridge, he deftly portrays the flow of nightlife, weaving together the vibrant pulse of the streets and late-night gatherings. Jakub Gessler | Family Portrait.

London-based photographer and director Jakub Gessler invites you to explore a delightful and heartfelt collection of portraits that celebrate the enduring and quirky relationships between humans and their beloved pets. Inspired by the charm of 1980s yearbook photos and family portraits, Jakub's work radiates warmth, humor, and a nostalgic sentimentality.

At the heart of this exhibition lies an exploration of the evolving definition of family. Jakub's portraits reflect a world where family is no longer strictly biological but increasingly chosen. In an era often characterised by minimalism and detachment, Jakub's work stands as a joyful celebration of unconditional love and companionship.

"This project began with a simple idea: I wanted a picture of me and my cat," akub shares. What started as a personal project quickly grew, with friends, acquaintances, and even strangers joining the initiative. From casual Instagram messages to spontaneous photo shoots, Jakub welcomed everyone, asking only for donations to a charity of their choice. "Every image is special to me," he reflects. His collection is more than just a series of photographs; it's a celebration of connection, love, and the beautiful simplicity of shared moments.



"I have been to restaurants in Soho whose denizens have crossed social and geographical barriers to reach them. In one, I have seen a girl sitting amid Clint Jackson Walker pandemonium with a book open on her knees and her little finger entwined with that of her true love. Of course she was not really listening and not really reading and not communicating with her friend in any way that required effort or style.

It would be hard to say whether Walker caused the death of human speech or whether his art came to fill an already widening void. But unless this art is stopped now, the human race, mumbling, snapping its fingers and twitching it's hips, will sink back into an amoebic state where it will take a coagulation of hundreds of teenagers to make up a single unit of vital force, which, once formed, will only live on sedatives, consume itself on the terraces of football stadia, and die. Procrastinatus | Sweden

Over 15 years ago, Emil Bardh, Olof Schröder, Emmanuel and Jonatan Moreno performed Procrastinatus at the New Media Meeting using Albeton Live and Resolume.

The landscape of visual electronica was a different world back then, as was the interconnected electronic ecosystem. New social media offerings like Facebook were forging a zeitgeist, replacing Myspace for popularity and the creative tools still in early release. The new media meeting described to embody "contemporary digital culture and knowledge production by inviting artists, scientists, and audiences from around the world" augur to this tune. The developing concepts, mainstay today, were being forged in experimentation

"The video is the result of an experiment in letting audio and visual loops come together in a live performance. The concept is to allow sound and image to interact in order to create a synchronized experience." say Procratinatus.

The Procrastinatus team remains active today. "Emil is the visual wizard, Olof and Emmanuel are beat crushing music machines and Jonatan is the mix master. We have performed live- and DJ-sets together since 2008."

It has been over a decade since Procrastinatus was first screened in Perth at the Perth Cultural Centre Screen, coinciding with the debut of the FRINGE WORLD prototype. In 2025, we revisit this pioneering project with a special 78-minute screening of the original 2009 audio-visual performance.

Hear the image. See the sound. Time travel, to the early days of visual electronica.

This engaging exhibition sheds light on the crucial role Australian government photographers have played in preserving our nation's visual heritage, stirring memories and sparking conversations.


The National Archives of Australia is dedicated to collecting, managing, preserving, and making publicly accessible the records of the Australian Government.










